On the 5th Of August 1799, land was granted in Osgoode Township, along the Rideau, Just south of the Catholic church, to Dr. Solomon Jones. He received 14, 15, 16 in the Broken Front, and lots 15 & 16 in the first concession. Two years later, in 1801, land was granted toCrowder. Elizabeth Eastman, Mary Cameron, Elizabeth Pauptz, Simon Fraser, Ephraim Jones. These early landowners were either prominent men in the American Revolution, or the sons and daughters of United Empire Loyalists. The latter, at the age of twenty-one, were entitled to 200 acres each.

In a petition of Solomon Jones dated March 12, 1793, he states "... I served as a Surgeons Mate during the late American War and have drawn for myself and family nine hundred acres of land. I consider myself entitled to eleven hundred more." He had served under Dr. George Smythe of Fort Edward in the Albany district. Dr. Smythe came to Canada with his two sons and was granted land in the present Smiths Falls area. It is unlikely that Solomon Jones ever lived in Osgoode Township, as he built for himself a beautiful stone house in the area of Maitland, two miles from the Blue Church, where he was buried in 1822. The house is still standing. Dr. Jones was a saddle-back doctor who is said to have treated the sick from the Ottawa to the St. Lawrence. As Judge and Justice of the Peace, his name is on many early documents relating to Osgoode Township. Thad Leavitt, in his "History of Leeds and Grenville", written 1879, states of the four Jones brothers, "They all seem to have selected their Military Grants with consummate judgment, for there are no more charmingly situated lands in Ontario today than those located by the Jones Brothers."

Edward Jessup, Major of Jessups corp in the Revolution, and a wealthy Lumberman who had thousands of acres straddling the Hudson, petitioned the Government on the 7th April, 1788, for a grant on the south bank of the Grand River (Ottawa), 4 miles above and 4 miles below the entrance of the Rideau, in order that he might lay out and settle a corridor of Townships, 8 miles square, running for the forty miles to the settlement on the St. Lawrence. Evidently his request was not granted.

The first person who made his home in Carleton County was Roger Stevens Junior, whom the Historian Cruikshanks calls "The Forgotten Patriot". His Tory feelings are clearly described in 'Caverley's History of Pittsford Vermont' written ca 1870. Roger had the first mill there which he had erected in 1772 on what was known as Stevens Brook. Because of his views he had to escape with his wife and two daughters, his wife Martha dying at Sorel, Quebec in 1780. In 1793, May 13, Roger wrote from Marlborough, to the Secretary of the Governor at Niagara:

"The inclosed Petition for a Township on the Rideau. I have also to request you will please to acquaint His Excellence that I have been settled at this place near three years and eight months of that time without a neighbour; and that it was my attempt in settling there the Grant of two Townships, already laid out on the Rideau, which are now settling.

"I have erected a good Saw-mill on the Great Falls on the River Rideau, and have made the necessary preparation to build a Grist-mill

next Fall. I have been at great expense in building the aforesaid Mill.Commend me to the Governor in Council for a Grant of four hundred acres of my compliment of Land to be laid on them Falls....I shall have the satisfaction.....of having commence the settlement the settle- ment on the Rideau....."

His request for 400 acres was granted. He was entitled to 1600 acres in addition to that received.

On 17th December 1793, there is another Petition to the same Governor,--

"The Petition of the Widow Polly Stevens....."

"Your Petitioner had the misfortune to have her Husband Drowned last Fall - and is left with three small Children, and lately lost her Husband & moveables & provisions by fire.

"Your Petitioner....prays your Excellency will be pleased to grant her eight hundred acres of land - that is 200 for herself and three small children....this being the Land on which your Petitioner's Husband, Ensign Roger Stevens made his first Improvements - which were the first Improvements made in this Wilderness...."

Early in December, a child had been born in Carleton County, Edmund Burritt, son of Martha Stevens, Roger's oldest daughter, and her husband Stephen Burritt, who had come to live in the vicinity.

There are many tales as to how Roger was drowned in the Rideau near the mouth of the river that was named after him, Stevens Creek. In his Atlas, Belden says Roger was exploring to the Chaudière with William Merrick. Guy Carleton Stevens, Roger's oldest son, wrote from Augusta in 1837: ".....the Autumn of 1791 he was unfortunately drowned while on a tour exploring the then wilderness in order to settle his wife and family." Anyone who has read of the prowess of this Stevens family in the Wilderness would wonder about this accidental drowning. William Merrick had the lands that had been assigned to Roger Stevens registered in the Merrick name.

Christopher Babuty Stevens, the youngest son, was granted lot 7 Concession 5 in Osgoode Township. Thus the early History of our Town- ship has strong links with the American Revolution.

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In the last Newsletter there was an error in the date of the editorial on the building of the place of worship at Metcalfe corner where Mrs. Archibald McDonell had her property. 1859 should have read 1839, an important time in the building of the first Churches in Osgoode.

Evidently the Methodists were the first to hold property in the Township. A statute had been passed in the ninth year of the reign of George the Fourth, that is in 1829, entitled "An Act for the Relief of Religious Societies". Duly appointed trustees were allowed to ownland in the name of their religious organizations. William Doctor and Sarah Doctor his wife, on the 27th day of March 1834, conveyed for the sum of sixpence, receipt attached, to the three trustees, William York, Donald McIntosh and Henry Hanna, of the Wesleyan-Methodist Church in Canada, a site for the purpose of a Chapel and Burying-Ground containing by admeasurement Three Roodscomprising so much of Lot Number Twenty, in the Eighth Con- cession, of the said Township of Osgoode and separated by the Nine- Mile Road from lot Number Twenty in the said Concession." The docu- ment was signed by the three Trustees and witnessed by William Popham. This is the property on the hill towards the east of Metcalfe. Any other regular minister of any other protestant denomination of Christians might preach and perform public religious service in the said Chapel when it was not required for use by the Methodist Ministers.

On December 30, 1834, a Petition with 66 signatures was sent to the Lieut. Gov. of Upper Canada. It stated in part:

".....Your Petitioners, warmly attached to the Faith and Worship of their Fathers, have during their Settlement in Osgoode, unhappily been, in a great measure deprived of the privilege of attending on religious ordinances...."

"....They are desirous to secure..a clergyman of the Scottish Church under whom they will be taught to honor the King" while they "fear God".....having to purchase their lands from the Original

Nominees....renders them less able at present to support a Clergyman ...they have resolved to apply for a Grant of one of the vacant Clergy Reserves within the Township as a Glebe for a Clergyman of the Scottish Church and upon whom they propose to erect a suitable place of worship. Therefore your Petitioners...wish you to set apart Lot No 38 in the 3rd Con...to be conceded accordingly."

The comment on the petition reads "...it is necessary they state what persons are to have charge of the Trust." There is no record of Trustees names being sent. Among the 66 signatures are those of the three Trustees of the Methodist Church named above, Archibald McDonnell's and his sons, and those who were Charter members of the Baptist Church formed 1839. A similar Petition was sent July 29th 1836 with 45 signatures asking for the same lot. (south of Dalmeny). The comment on the outside of the Document reads: "In Council 23rd February 1837. In the present state of the Clergy Reserve Question the Council do not think it advisable to recommend any further applications."

In the year following the upheaval of 1837 that was caused in part by the question of the Clergy Reserves we see a frame Church being built by the Catholics at Metcalie Corner and a Log Church being built by the Presbyterians at Springhill.

According to Rev. Wm. Lohead, first Minister of the Presbyterian Congregation in Osgoode, a Log Church was erected 1838 'measuring 22 by 28 feet, on the South West corner of lot 30 con 7'. Mr. Lohead says an acre was set aside as a grave-yard in 1835.

The few Baptists in the Township had been meeting in homes until the arrival of their first minister, Rev. Daniel McPhail, in 1840. Services were also held in barns. Rev. Robert Alexander Fyfe, friend of McPhail and founder of The Canadian Literary Institute - Woodstock College - wrote to McPhail, "I have preached in mahogany pulpits covered with silk velvet, but I would rather preach behind that little pine board in Duncan McDonald's barn".

As yet we have very little information regarding the beginnings of the Church of England in Osgoode Township.

According to the census of 1841-2, the religious population at that time was as follows: Church of England 221, Church of Scotland 333, Church of Rome 386, Wesleyan Methodists 161, Baptists 138, Presbyterians 9, Lutheran 9, Unitarian 5.

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During the last few months we have been exploring our Township. During a Vernon to Dalmeny Tour we visited two former Church sites, Babylon, a log house, two stone houses being restored, the Swale School. When we visited Springhill we had a map indicating the location of about thirty former residences, a Post Office, Church, Cheese Factory, as well as the Cemetery.

At Kenmore we were graciously entertained by the Women's Institute, and old pictures of the village showed its importance in the lumbering business. The visit to the Loney House, built 1850, and still in the Loney name was a special treat. We have found from records at the Public Archives, a list of the tenants of the Indian Lands (Martintown) from 1820. Many of these people or their descendants are now in Osgoode Township. Samuel Loney and Richard Loney signed a petition in 1820. In the first concession near Grays River Samuel Loney and the Parlingers lived. Edward, William and Samuel Loney were also in the second concession.

We hope, in the next few months, to have for distribution, short accounts of the three areas we have visited to date.

Mr. A. Barnes, of Toronto, visited us in August and advised us regarding our being incorporated as The Osgoode Township Historical Society operating a Museum. We have applied to be incorporated and because of this step we shall be in line for grants from the Provincial Government under the Ministry of Colleges and Universities Act. One of the conditions is that we must be open to the public on a regular basis. Since October 11th, 1975, the building has been open weekdays from 10.00 A.M. to 4.00 P.M. and on Sundays from 1.00 to 5.00 p.m. This arrangement will continue until further notice.
